1	WHAT CAN YOU ORDER IN A SPANISH CAFÉ?	- Read Fluently - Speak Confidently	- La cafetería = the café in Spanish. - Spanish nouns have gender (masculine/feminine) and can be singular or plural. - Masculine singular nouns use the article un and masculine plural nouns use unos. - Some Spanish food and drink look or sound similar to English words. - Typical café items include un bocadillo de jamón, un pastel de limón, unos churros, un café, un té, and un zumo de naranja. - Nouns ending in a vowel add -s to become plural; nouns ending in a consonant add -es.	- Read short texts independently. - Express personal experiences and responses. - Write short phrases from memory with spelling that is readily understandable. - Demonstrate a growing vocabulary.	Pupils should be taught to: - listen attentively to spoken language and show understanding by joining in and responding - explore the patterns and sounds of language through songs and rhymes and link the spelling, sound and meaning of words
2	WHAT NEW FOODS CAN YOU SPOT IN THE SPANISH CAFÉ?	- Speak Confidently - Write imaginatively	- Spanish nouns have gender (masculine or feminine) and can be singular or plural. - Feminine singular nouns use the article una, and feminine plural nouns use unas. - This lesson introduces ten new feminine food and drink items found in a Spanish café. - Some new Spanish foods include: una tortilla de patatas, una paella, and unas croquetas. - Some foods keep their Spanish name in English, such as una paella or unas patatas bravas.	- Demonstrate a growing vocabulary. - Write a few short sentences using familiar expressions.	
3	HOW DO YOU ORDER FOOD IN	- Speak Confidently - Read Fluently	- The phrase "Quisiera..." = I would like... and is used to order food or drink politely. "Por favor" = please and helps create a polite request. "¿Qué deseas?" = What would you like?	- Ask others to repeat words or phrases if necessary. - Ask and answer simple questions and talk about interests.	

	A SPANISH CAFÉ?		• The phrases “Tengo hambre” and “Tengo sed” mean I am hungry and I am thirsty. • Spanish nouns have gender and number, which affect the article used (un/una/unos/unas). • The conjunction “y” means and. This helps join two items in an order.	• Take part in discussions and tasks. • Read and understand the main points in short written texts.	• engage in conversations; ask and answer questions; express opinions and respond to those of others; seek clarification and help* • appreciate stories, songs, poems and rhymes in the language
4	HOW DO YOU FINISH YOUR ORDER IN A SPANISH CAFÉ?	• Speak Confidently • Write imaginatively	• The phrase “La cuenta por favor” means the bill please. • “Gracias” = thank you • “Adiós” = goodbye. • A full café conversation includes greeting, ordering, asking politely, and ending the interaction. • Using polite phrases such as “por favor” and “gracias” is important in Spanish-speaking cultures. • Learners can now respond confidently when asked “¿Qué deseas?” (What would you like?).	• Ask others to repeat words or phrases if necessary. • Ask and answer simple questions and talk about interests. • Take part in discussions and tasks. • Demonstrate a growing vocabulary • Write a few short sentences using familiar expressions. • Express personal experiences and responses.	
5	HOW MUCH DOES YOUR SPANISH CAFÉ ORDER COST?	• Understand the culture of the countries in which the language is spoken	• Spain uses the euro (€) as its official currency. • Euro coins include 1, 2, 5, 10, 20 and 50 • Euro notes include 5, 10, 20, 50, 100, 200 and 500 euros. • When saying amounts in Spanish, money is often expressed using “con” (with), e.g. dos euros con cincuenta. • Recognising coins and notes helps calculate café bills accurately. • Understanding Spanish currency builds cultural awareness of how people pay in Spain and other European countries.	• Describe with some interesting details some aspects of countries or communities where the language is spoken.
