Identify and compare the suitability of a variety of everyday materials, including wood, metal, plastic, glass, brick/rock, and paper/cardboard for particular uses.	- Compare and group materials together, according to whether they are solids, liquids or gases. - Observe that some materials change state when they are heated or cooled, and measure the temperature at which this happens in degrees Celsius ($^{\circ}\text{C}$), building on their teaching in mathematics. - Identify the part played by evaporation and condensation in the water cycle and associate the rate of evaporation with temperature.	- Give reasons, based on evidence from comparative and fair tests, for the particular uses of everyday materials, including metals, wood and plastic. - Demonstrate that dissolving, mixing and changes of state are reversible changes. - Explain that some changes result in the formation of new materials, and that this kind of change is not usually reversible, including changes associated with burning, oxidation and the action of acid on bicarbonate of soda.
Understand movement, forces and magnets	- Notice and describe how things move, using simple comparisons such as faster and slower. - Compare how different things move.	- Recognise that they need light in order to see things and that dark is the absence of light. - Notice that light is reflected from surfaces. - Recognise that light from the sun can be dangerous and that there are ways to protect their eyes. - Recognise that shadows are formed when the light from a light source is blocked by a solid object. - Find patterns in the way that the size of shadows change.	- Understand that light appears to travel in straight lines. - Use the idea that light travels in straight lines to explain that objects are seen because they give out or reflect light into the eyes. - Use the idea that light travels in straight lines to explain why shadows have the same shape as the objects that cast them, and to predict the size of shadows when the position of the light source changes. - Explain that we see things because light travels from light sources to our eyes or from light sources to objects and then to our eyes.
Investigate sound and hearing	Observe and name a variety of sources of sound, noticing that we hear with our ears.	- Identify how sounds are made, associating some of them with something vibrating. - Recognise that vibrations from sounds travel through a medium to the ear.	- Find patterns between the pitch of a sound and features of the object that produced it. - Find patterns between the volume of a sound and the strength of the vibrations that produced it. - Recognise that sounds get fainter as the distance from the sound source increases.

		including cells, wires, bulbs, switches and buzzers. - Identify whether or not a lamp will light in a simple series circuit, based on whether or not the lamp is part of a complete loop with a battery. - Recognise that a switch opens and closes a circuit and associate this with whether or not a lamp lights in a simple series circuit. - Recognise some common conductors and insulators, and associate metals with being good conductors.	brightness of bulbs, the loudness of buzzers and the on/off position of switches. Understand the Earth's movement in space	- Observe the apparent movement of the Sun during the day. - Observe changes across the four seasons. - Observe and describe weather associated with the seasons and how day length varies.	- Describe the movement of the Earth relative to the Sun in the solar system. - Describe the movement of the Moon relative to the Earth.	- Describe the movement of the Earth, and other planets, relative to the Sun in the solar system. - Describe the movement of the Moon relative to the Earth. - Describe the Sun, Earth and Moon as approximately spherical bodies. - Use the idea of the Earth's rotation to explain day and night and the apparent movement of the sun across the sky.
